## **Overdose Awareness Day Commemoration Planned for August 31**

In 2017, drug overdoses, primarily from opioids, caused the deaths of 5,260 people in Pennsylvania. 735 people perished in Allegheny County alone.

For the fourth year, the Southwest Pennsylvania community will gather at **Trinity Cathedral** in downtown Pittsburgh at **noon** on **August 31** for an ecumenical commemoration of **International Overdose Awareness Day**, co-sponsored by CLEAR, Christian Associates, and the Downtown Pittsburgh Ministerium.

The service has included scriptures, prayers, testimonies, and the chiming of a bell to represent lives that have been lost to overdose, with leaders representing a variety of Christian traditions.

International Overdose Awareness Day is a global event held every August 31 to raise

awareness of overdose, reduce the stigma of a drug-related death, and acknowledge the grief felt by families and friends of those who have died by overdose.



# Who is my neighbor?



The lawyer's provocative question in Luke 10:29 inspired one of Jesus' most famous parables: the story of the Good Samaritan. Today just as then, we too often fail to see all humanity as neighbors, a struggle made especially clear by continued racial inequity.

Christian Associates is now preparing the third volume in our series "The Word in Our Voices". Who is My Neighbor? Southwest Pennsylvania Preaches on Race in America will draw together sermons, essays, and other writings by religious leaders throughout our region.

# REFLECTIONS ALONG TH

Dear friends,

When Christians think of the year, we can imagine three different calendars overlapping one another:

- First, there's the **liturgical calendar**. In the Western church, the year begins on the first Sunday of Advent, building through Lent into the intense drama of Holy Week and celebrations of Eastertide, then dissipating after Pentecost into the long green season of Ordinary Time. The Eastern church's calendar has a similar pattern but a different place to begin: in the East, the new year starts on September 1.
- We also follow the **secular calendar**, a January to December affair: in this schedule, the summer is a time for cookouts, baseball, fireworks, and vacations.
- Churches also tend to follow the academic calendar. The "program year" of many churches begins, like the school year, in September and wraps up in early June. During the summer, many choirs, committees, and Sunday Schools take a break.



In all three of these calendars, the summer offers a different rhythm: a relaxation of the tyranny of datebooks and deadlines. After the mania of spring, summer provides a little breathing space, the opportunity to sit back and take stock. I find that it's the only time of year when I can do any filing (unless the stacks of paper on my desk count as files), or when I can take a long view of planning and strategy.

Will you join me in taking time to invest in relationships this summer?

This summer, there's another goal I'd like to take on: I'd like to fill these quieter days with conversation. Whether it's the "one to one" meetings on which community organizing is built, the networking sessions recommended by coaches, or simply grabbing coffee with a bestie, we all know that big projects begin with simple conversations. So, this summer, I'd like to make new friends and make new connections, to reinvest in familiar relationships and dream with partners about what the future may bring.

With that in mind, I'm blocking off time on my summer calendar for one-on-one meetings throughout our region: with bishops and judicatory executives, with clergy, with community leaders, with directors of partner organizations. I want to meet new people, thank our supporters, find out what's new and interesting in our area, and think aloud through some new ideas.

I wonder if you'd like to join me. And by that I mean not only that you might call my office and find a time for us to get together, but also that you would pursue this goal in your own neighborhood. Perhaps the church down the road has a new pastor whom you have not yet met. Perhaps you'd like to chat with your local police chief, or the director of your community food pantry. Maybe you have a close friend who needs to get back on your calendar, for renewed laughter and

mutual support. Will you join me in taking time to invest

in relationships this summer?

Let's pray that our summer connections might yield abundant fruit in the months to come. I suspect that as we meet our neighbors, we'll find there is nothing ordinary about this season of Ordinary Time.

## Clean Air Council Recruits Leaders for Groups of Ten to Reduce Air Pollution

"We need to find ways, as churches, to support sound programs which seek to preserve from pollution the air, the water, and the land around which we live. To speak of the reintegration of creation today is first to speak words of repentance and to make commitments of stewardship, commitments toward the formation of a new way of living for the whole of humanity."

The American Lung Association recently ranked Southwest Pennsylvania as having the tenth worst air quality in the United States. This air pollution can cause respiratory and heart ailments, and even cancer.

To respond to this menace, people of faith from many Christian traditions are stepping up to join in the SWPA Neighbors for Clean Air Campaign, sponsored by the Clean Air Council, by leading or becoming a member of a Group of Ten.

A Group of Ten is a gathering of ten (or more) concerned community members who meet once a month for about two hours.

In this meeting, members will review a curriculum together to learn about air

pollution and other environmental issues. Then, leaders will present a suggested action step that members can take to address the issues at hand.

Group of Ten members will simply attend the monthly meeting and pursue the action step, for no more than a three hour monthly commitment.

Group of Ten leaders must be able to commit four hours per month to recruiting members and organizing and facilitating the group.

The Clean Air Council will train leaders and provide leaders with the curriculum, action steps, and facilitator notes.




