The consecration of the next ruling hierarch of the Archdiocese of Pittsburgh and Western Pennsylvania, Orthodox Church in America, Archimandrite Melchisedek will occur on June 26 and 27 at St. Alexander Nevsky Cathedral, McCandless. On Friday, June 26 at 7:00 p.m. there will be the Rite of Nomination and Proclamation; it will be followed by Vespers. On Saturday, June 27 at 8:30 a.m. the Rite of Consecration and the Hierarchical Divine Liturgy will be celebrated. His Beatitude,

Canada for the Orthodox Church in America will preside over the consecration. A Grand Banquet follows at the Hilton Hotel in Downtown Pittsburgh at 2:00 p.m.

Bishop-Elect Archimandrite Melchisedek succeeds Archbishop KYRILL who died in June 2007 after serving the Archdiocese for 29 years, as well as being hierarch of the Toledo (Bulgarian) Diocese. The Bishop-Elect was born Thomas Pleska in Dayton, Ohio on August 20, 1942. He is a graduate of St. Vladimir's Orthodox Seminary in Crestwood, New York and was ordained to the holy priesthood in 1986 by Metropolitan THEODOSIUS. During his priesthood, he was the pastor of churches in Pottstown, Old Forge, and Simpson, Pennsylvania; and Meridian, Connecticut. In 1998, he entered into the monastic life in Greece. In 2004, he was tonsured to the Great Schema by his Abbot Archimandrite Dionysios and raised to the rank of Archimandrite and Spiritual Father by the local Metropolitan in Greece.

On November 15, 2008, Archimandrite Melchisedek was nominated to the Holy Synod by an Extraordinary Assembly of the Archdiocese of Pittsburgh and Western Pennsylvania to be the next Bishop of this historic Archdiocese. On April 2, 2009, at the OCA Chancery in Oyster Bay Cove, New York, the Holy Synod of Bishops of the Orthodox Church in America acted upon the Archdiocesan nomination and canonically elected Archimandrite Melchisedek as the next Bishop of Pittsburgh and Western Pennsylvania.

REFLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY



Dear Siblings in Our Lord,

One of my favorite icons is of St. Peter and St. Paul embracing. As we know from scripture, these two had a confrontational relationship with each other over how to accomplish their common mission of evangelizing the world. Yet, the iconographer writes them as reconciled in Christ despite their differences. It is a beautiful icon of overcoming conflicts and living with sometimes difficult and hard-to-understand people and issues for the sake of the unity of the Church, the Body of Christ. Oh, how we need to pray that icon's message today!

A registration form was submitted for a recent conference. The anonymous sender commended the planners on the theme, proposed speakers and workshops, but noted that they would not participate because of the facility where the conference was to be held. The site had been chosen because of the spacious facility and the generous hospitality of the staff, not as a theological statement endorsing that church's mission or theological stance. I grieve for that colleague and any others who denied themselves the opportunity to grow because their perceived differences with the facility's owners were stronger than their commitment to reconciliation in Christ and the unity of the Church.

Similarly, two devout believers were asked to serve on a committee. Both confess their love for Christ and are exemplar servants in their respective congregations. Yet, one declined to serve because of the presence of the other on the committee. They were on opposing sides of a divisive ethical issue facing our society and how "true" believers should respond. Apart from reconciliation in Christ with our neighbors, none of us can claim to make appropriate "Christian" moral and ethical decisions. Oh, that these two could embrace as writes the iconographer!

I will be challenged personally this summer as my Lutheran denomination considers its social teaching and standards for rostered leaders. I know that I will be a partisan in defense of what I believe to be faithful to scripture and catholic tradition. But I also pray that the Spirit will keep me and my sisters and brothers on the other side of the issue reconciled in Christ amidst our differences. We all need to learn from Peter and Paul about the primacy of reconciliation in Christ with our neighbors, if we are to be authentic and effective in our witness to the world.


New Options at Trinity School for Ministry

Beginning in September 2009, Trinity School for Ministry in Ambridge will offer the ability for students to complete a Master of Arts in Mission, or MAM degree, through a combination of distance courses and residential intensive courses.
