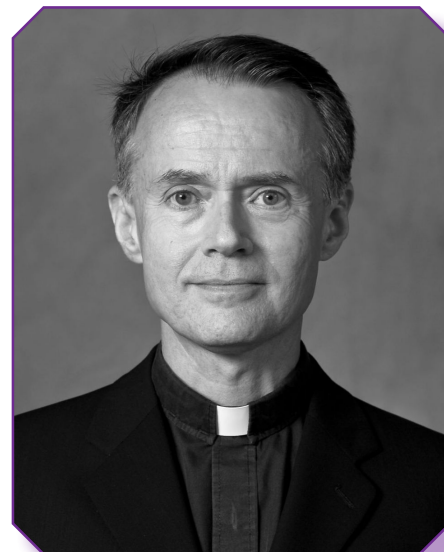
Ecumenical Theologian to Speak on "Catholic-Orthodox Relations: Hopes for the Future"

The 9th Annual SS Cyril and Methodius Lecture will take place on **Monday, May 4, 2009** at St. Paul's Seminary in Pittsburgh at 7:00 p.m. The featured speaker is Rev. Ronald G. Roberson. "Catholic-Orthodox Relations: Hopes for the Future" draws on Fr. Roberson's extensive expertise in ecumenical studies.

Ordained a Roman Catholic priest in 1977, Fr. Roberson began studying the Eastern Churches of

Greece, Romania, Bulgaria and Turkey while traveling extensively in Eastern Europe and the Middle East in 1982. In 1988, he was appointed to the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity (Eastern section) in Vatican City, where his responsibilities included relations with the Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople, the Orthodox Churches of Greece, Cyprus, Romania, and Finland, and the Orthodox in the Diaspora. Fr. Roberson has presented conferences in ecumenism since 1993. He has served as the Associate Director of the Secretariat for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs on the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops since 1995. Fr. Roberson currently serves as a Catholic member of the International Dialogue between the Catholic Church and the Oriental Orthodox Churches.

The annual lecture series is sponsored by the SS Cyril & Methodius Byzantine Catholic Seminary. The Seminary, located in Pittsburgh, serves as the center of learning for Byzantine Catholic Churches in North America. There is no charge

REFLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY



Dear Siblings in Our Lord,

“So they (Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome) went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.” (Mark 16:8)

Those women fled the empty tomb of Jesus in fear and terror. “What does this mean?” - a stone rolled back from the grave, an angelic announcement and a commission? “Jesus has been raised!” “Go, tell!” But “they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.”

Fear and terror are normative experiences for folk today. “Has the stock market hit the bottom yet?” “Will I have a job tomorrow?” “What if I get ill without health insurance?” “I’m afraid to ask for help.” Like the women at the tomb we’re even afraid to verbalize our fears and anxiety. The global economic downturn has caused all of us to question our future plans, be they a college education for our kids, hopes for retirement, a new home, etc. We have become cautious about what purchases we make, and our lack of consumption further distresses the downward economic spiral. “What does this mean?”

We who are the Church, Christ’s living body in the world today have a tremendous opportunity this Eastertide. In the face of fear and terror about our physical health, economic prosperity, and clouded global future, we dare to boldly preach death and resurrection – Jesus crucified and raised by the Father to new life! Yes, we are bold to call the faithful to confident trust in that God who gives life to a dead man, our human brother and to each of us through him. Because of that faith in Jesus life transforming resurrection, we can be bold in inviting the faithful to die and be raised anew; to die to the norms of individualism, self-gratification, consumerism and over-consumption, and to be raised to a new life based on the Kingdom’s norms of love of God and neighbor, of sacrifice and service to family and the needy “other” in our midst.

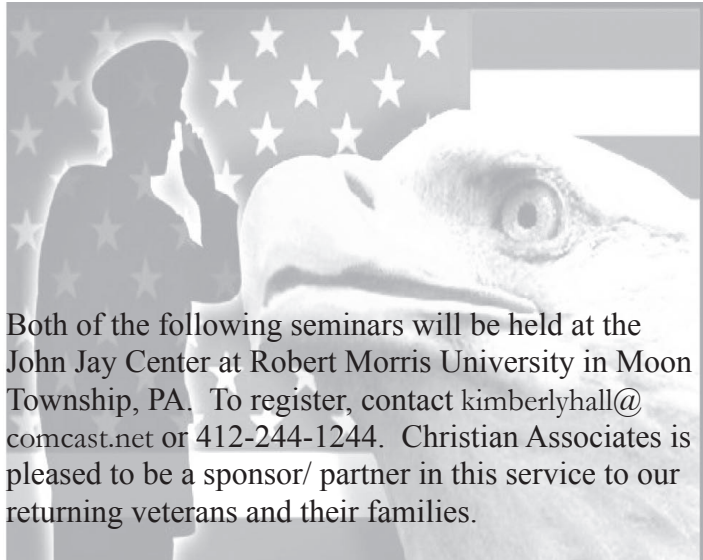
Of course such a personal resurrection by the faithful may seem to be un-American. After all, spending less on self and doing more with and for others will not help grow an economy based on conspicuous consumption. But in the process we may be able to help transform our culture and society in life-transforming ways. Just imagine a community where people actually talked with each other instead of being fixated before the TV or Wii. Imagine helping a struggling student with reading and telling a lonely elder the stories of God’s love through the ages. Imagine growing a garden with our neighbors solely to provide produce to the local food pantry. Such is the power of the resurrected, transformed life. But that can only happen when we are bold in proclaiming Jesus death and resurrection and our dying and being raised.

Happy Easter! “Christ is Risen! He is risen, indeed!” Proclaim Him boldly!

Oberammergau Passion Play

Pastor Don Green, Christian Associates' Executive Director, will serve as spiritual director on a ten-day pilgrimage to historic sites of the European Reformation and the Oberammergau Passion Play, May 17-28, 2010.

The pilgrimage begins with a Reformation heritage tour of Switzerland and Germany. Participants will visit and rehearse the stories of the great Protestant reformers – Luther, Calvin, and Zwingli as they tour Geneva, Zurich, Augsburg, Worms, and Wittenberg.

The climax of the pilgrimage will be the Oberammergau Passion Play. Every 10 years, 2,000 villagers of Oberammergau stage and perform this Passion Play in fulfillment of a pledge to God made in 1634, to keep their families safe from the plague. Performed on an open-air stage, with the sky and the mountains of beautiful Bavarian Germany as a backdrop, the play, supported by a dramatic text and accompanied by a full orchestra and choir, rehearses in 25 scenes the passion and death of Jesus. PA Council of Churches Considers Gun Violence Resolution

The Commission on Public Witness for the PA Council of Churches is asking the Council's Board of Directors to adopt a resolution "to prevent gun violence." Noting, "A rising tide of handgun violence (which) affects all corners of the Commonwealth," the Commission is asking that the council and its member bodies seek enactment of the Lost or Stolen Reporting Requirement Act and the One Handgun a Month Act. "The purpose of this legislation is to disrupt the illegal distribution system that makes handguns available to felons, drug dealers, and other violent individuals in the Commonwealth..." the commission continues, that "The Pennsylvania Council of Churches recognizes the problem as one of handgun distribution, abuse, and violence and not gun ownership, acknowledges that legal gun ownership for the purpose of self defense is a right of most citizens... and asserts the need for responsible gun ownership." The Board of Directors will consider the resolution at their April 14 meeting.
