Resource Booklet Helps Churches Engage in Father's Day Pledge


This Father's Day, Christian Associates of Southwest Pennsylvania is joining with the FISA Foundation and other community partners to say NO MORE to domestic violence and sexual assault.

As people of faith and disciples of the Prince of Peace, Christians must speak out against gender violence, which impacts families in all our congregations.

Gender violence is not "a women's issue" – it impacts everyone, and people of all genders must work to end it.

At the heart of the "Southwest PA Says No More" initiative is the Father's Day Pledge, a call to men of courage and good will to participate fully in the struggle against gender violence:

**Southwest PA Says
NO MORE!**



I WILL WORK TO END GENDER VIOLENCE AND PLEDGE TO:

- Not use violence in any form in my relationships.
- Speak up if another man is abusing his partner or is disrespectful or abusive to women and girls. I will not remain silent!
- Be an ally to women who are working to end all forms of gender violence.
- Mentor and teach boys about how to be men in ways that don't involve degrading or abusing girls and women. I will lead by example.

To help congregations engage in this project, Christian Associates has authored a free 12-page booklet, "Peace, Be Still!" The booklet includes everything you need to engage your church in the Father's Day Pledge to end gender violence:

REFLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY

Dear friends,

In a field in Gush Etzion, I took a picture of some dirt. Or at least, that's what it seemed like to me – a few rocks, some reddish soil, and a few straggly blades of grass near Bethlehem, in the land that most maps call the West Bank. But to the men we met at Roots, a peacemaking project there, this land was far more: to Rabbi Hanan Schlesinger, this land was Israel. To Ali Abu Awwad, this land was Palestine. To both, the very dirt itself was holy, meaningful, beloved.

This spring, I spent eight days walking the soil of the Holy Land, visiting Israel and Palestine on the first journey of a brand new organization, Interfaith Partners for Peace. Christian ministers and Jewish rabbis traveled in pairs from cities across the U.S., visiting sacred places, meeting with political and academic leaders, and touring peacemaking organizations. We learned that the conflict in that region is never simple, but nor is it entirely hopeless.

Throughout the journey, we studied texts together, both scriptural and contemporary. This poem, “The Place Where We Are Right” by Israeli poet Yehuda Amichai, seemed particularly apt:

From the place where we are right
Flowers will never grow
In the spring.
The place where we are right
Is hard and trampled
Like a yard.
But doubts and loves
Dig up the world
Like a mole, a plow.
And a whisper will be heard in the place
Where the ruined
House once stood.¹

At Roots, Hanan and Ali told us how face-to-face encounter with their neighbors had changed their hearts: as Amichai writes, they developed doubts and loves. They began to realize that the narratives they'd long believed about their own group's rightness were not the only story. They began to care about each other, to establish real friendship, despite their differing views. Doubts and loves dig up the world, and make possible growth, fresh beginnings, new life.

Whether in situations of political-religious conflict, like Israel and Palestine, or in moments of conflict within and among our own churches, I hope we will be open to the doubts and loves that the Holy Spirit is plowing in the hardened soil of our own rightness. I hope we will question our own perspectives and find surprising friends. I hope we will attend to the surprising whisper of peace, which becomes audible when we listen closely to one another, even those with different points of view.

I hope we will find the very dirt under our feet breaking open, with doubts, with loves, with peace.



Pittsburgh Will Host First International Family Systems Conference

Scholars, Therapists, Clergy to gather in East Liberty August 2-5

Systems underlie all sorts of social organizations. When looking at individuals, it is best to start by situating them in the systems of which they are a part. Of course, the primary system we all find ourselves in is the family.

In the 20th century, Murray Bowen, a professor of psychiatry at Georgetown University, developed a set of concepts that define family processes, including triangles, sibling position, differentiation of self, and multigenerational processes.

These principles have enabled countless pastors to discover rich insights for helping counsel their parishioners effectively... and for understanding themselves better!

And, these same processes apply equally well to our congregations, as explored by Edwin Freeman in his magisterial work, *Generation to Generation*.

Other writers, too, have written practical books about the sometimes hidden inter-workings within churches and synagogues, including Ronald Richardson and Peter Steinke.

In Pittsburgh, the Western Pennsylvania Family Center has been teaching family process principles for 30 years. Pastors and laypersons have been regular participants in the classes and seminars sponsored by the Center.

This summer, the Center will host its first international conference on Bowen Family Systems Theory: "Bowen Theory Around the World."

For the first time ever, speakers and discussion leaders will come together from all parts of the globe to discuss the value of family systems thinking. The conference provides an opportunity to see first hand how truly universal family systems processes are. It will also underline the great value for us as pastors to learn and apply family systems principles.

The conference will take place August 2-5 at the Western Pennsylvania Family Center on N. Highland Ave. in East Liberty.

Health Insurance Enrollment Help Available

Did you know there are children in our region without health insurance?

Clergy and congregations can help connect these children and families to free or low-cost health insurance through the Healthy Together program.



Depending on household size and income, children and families may qualify for Medicaid or the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), and enrollment for both programs is available 365 days a year. These programs include coverage for inpatient and outpatient hospital services, screenings and preventative service, prescription drugs, immunizations, and mental health services.

Healthy Together's trained staff will walk families through the process of enrolling their children, and themselves, in the health insurance program that's right for them.
