Bishop Edward Malesic Becomes Shepherd to Diocese of Greensburg

With ancient ritual and vivid pageantry, the Roman Catholic Diocese of Greensburg ordained and installed its fifth bishop, the Most Rev. Edward Malesic, on July 13.

With his installation, Bishop Malesic became the newest member of Christian Associates' Council of Bishops and Judicatory Executives.

Bishop Malesic grew up in Enhaut, PA and was ordained in the Diocese of Harrisburg, where he served most recently as Judicial Vicar for the diocese and Pastor of Holy Infant Parish in York Haven. He is an alumnus of the Pontifical College Josephinium in Columbus, Ohio, and also received a licentiate in canon law from the Catholic University of America.

As a parish priest, Bishop Malesic participated in monthly breakfast gatherings of ecumenical clergy in his neighborhood, as well as several diocesan ecumenical initiatives. His interest in intra-Christian conversation, however, dates back even farther.

"The best religion class I ever had was the back of my trigonometry classroom in high school," Bishop Malesic remembered. "It was me, a Methodist, a fundamentalist, and an atheist." Through this informal group's questions and discussions, exploring and challenging each others' beliefs, Bishop Malesic said his own faith was strengthened and nourished.

Bishop Malesic told The Call that ecumenism will continue to be an important part of his ministry. "I do find strength in gathering with people who see the Christian faith through a different lens. The more we understand each other, the more we can be accepting of each other."

To help equip these leaders, this fall, Christian Associates will host 'Interfaith Relations and Religious Pluralism,' a course offered by the Seminary Consortium on Urban Pastoral Education (SCUPE) in conjunction with Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.

Using the variety of religious communities of the city of Pittsburgh as its classroom, the course will provide students with interfaith understandings, cultural competencies and practical theology for ministry.

The students will have the opportunity to learn directly from a variety of religious leaders as they visit Jewish, Muslim, Hindu, and Sikh houses of worship, among others.

They will examine their own theological perspectives, learn the skills of interfaith dialogue, and find avenues of interfaith solidarity that enable them to work together for justice and peace in the city.

The class will be taught by Dr. Lucinda Mosher, an Episcopal scholar and author who serves as Faculty Associate for Interfaith Studies at Hartford Seminary. Western Pennsylvanians may remember Dr. Mosher from the lecture on "Faith in the Neighborhood" that she offered last September at the launch event for the Greater Pittsburgh Interfaith Coalition.

The class will meet at the Christian Associates office in Lawrenceville, 204 37th St, Suite 201, on three Fridays from 1 p.m.-9 p.m. and Saturdays from 9 a.m.-5 p.m.: September 18-19 and 25-6 and October 30-31, with additional coursework online between the in-person sessions.

Local clergy and other interested Christians are encouraged to participate in the class as auditors, at a cost of \$450 each, with CEUs available for an additional \$25.

REFLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY WELLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY

Dear friends,

The summer is a slightly slower time around my office, and so in early July I took the opportunity to indulge in one of my favorite pastimes: *I made a color-coded to-do list*.

When I call it a favorite pastime, I'm not kidding. I've been making to-do lists as long as I've known how to write; when I was a kid, they featured such pressing tasks as "play outside" and "organize sticker collection." In college, I made sure my lists had exactly 100 items, so it was easy to calculate the percentage completed. Today, they've swollen to monster size: each one is a multi-page magnum opus, the perfect blend of productivity and procrastination.

Sorting through my desk and my email inbox, I numbered and categorized every single task necessary for the rest of the summer and beyond. Make a tentative schedule for SPARK Conversations (see page 8). Finalize site visits for the "Interfaith Relations and Religious Pluralism" class (see page 1). Work on our new Web site. Post to our Facebook page. Beside each task, I drew a small colored dot: red for the most urgent tasks, orange for slightly less so, onward through the rainbow to violet ("not time-sensitive").



Then, before actually doing anything on the list (after all, what would be the fun in that?) I took a quick break and headed downtown to the daily noontime Eucharist at First Lutheran Church. The Rev. Brian Evans, First Lutheran's senior pastor, opened the Bible and read from Matthew's Gospel:

Jesus said to his Apostles:
"As you go, make this proclamation:
'The Kingdom of heaven is at hand.'
Cure the sick, raise the dead,
cleanse the lepers, drive out demons."

All of a sudden, my collection of color-coded tasks seemed far from the mark. Long ago, Jesus wrote us the only to-do list we need: to proclaim the kingdom, cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, drive out demons. This is our calling – a high one, to be sure, but nothing is impossible with God.

As you read this, the fall will be upon us, with the gathering energy of a new school year, the re-start of Christian education programs, and the startling realization that Advent begins in only a dozen Sundays. In this busy season, as your own to-do list grows long, do not lose sight of the list that Jesus made for us. Drive out the demons of racism and greed. Restore the shunned and despairing – the lepers – to fellowship and grace. Bring new life to communities and congregations once left for dead. Heal ailing relationships and broken spirits. And in everything, in words and in deeds, let the world know that the Kingdom is at hand. Now that's worth color-coding in bright red!

Opportunities Abound to Study Solitary Confinement, Mass Incarceration

"Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them; those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured." - Hebrews 13:3

This fall, people of faith will have several opportunities to build understanding of the challenges faced by incarcerated people in our nation and ways to assist them through advocacy.

On Saturday, October 3 at 6 p.m., the Rev. Ron Stief, Executive Director of the National Religious Campaign Against Torture will be speaking at East Liberty Presbyterian Church (116 South Highland Ave., Pittsburgh) on "Witness to End the Torture of Solitary Confinement in U.S. Prisons."

Tens of thousands of prisoners – including children – experience prolonged solitary confinement, at a great cost to their mental health; NRCAT has been at the forefront of the movement to end the practice.

Later in October, the Pennsylvania Council of Churches is re-launching its annual conference with a multi-day event addressing the American criminal justice system from a moral perspective. "Lord, Let Our Eyes Be Opened: Breaking the Chains of Mass Incarceration" will take place at the Red Lion Hotel Harrisburg East from Friday evening, October 23 through Sunday, October 25.

Participants may also choose to attend a "Healing Communities" training on Friday or to participate in a lobby day at the State Capitol on Monday, October 26. Learn more about how poverty and racism affect incarceration and hear from experts such as Glenn E. Martin and Harold Dean Trulear. This is an excellent tool for congregations to understand the extent of the harm that prolonged solitary confinement has on people, especially juveniles and those with mental illness.


Dr. MacDougall is the Spiritual Care Coordinator at The Retreat, an addiction treatment center in Wayzata, MN. From 1994-2013, he was the Director of Spiritual Guidance at the Hazelden Foundation. He is a United Methodist minister who served as a parish pastor for 17 years in New Jersey and New England.

Dr. MacDougall is a graduate of Princeton Theological Seminary and the Theological School of Drew University, from which he earned a Doctor of Ministry degree with a focus in family therapy. He has been clean and sober since July 4, 1989.

The diaper bank, based at New Light Temple Baptist Church in the Hill District, is affiliated with the National Diaper Bank Network and distributes diapers free to families in need through partner agencies throughout the region.

Churches Can Help Alleviate Diaper Need

In Southwest PA, the estimated need of children of families living in poverty is approximately 140,000 diapers per day and growing.

Government programs do not provide diapers. Most childcare centers, even free and subsidized facilities, turn away children who arrive without an adequate supply of disposable diapers. Cloth diapers are not accepted at most centers. As a result, some parents cannot go to work or school consistently, thereby continuing the cycle of poverty.

Churches and other groups can help yearround or during National Diaper Need Awareness Week, September 28 – October 4, which is an opportunity to focus the community on the growing diaper crisis.

If you are interested in sponsoring a diaper drive during this week or at any time, Diaper Bank volunteers will help your staff to coordinate efforts.

Since the Diaper Bank's founding in 2012, churches of many denominations (including Episcopal, Presbyterian, and United Church of Christ, as well as Baptist) have hosted diaper drives. Presbyterian Women of Pittsburgh Presbytery will make the Western Pennsylvania Diaper Bank their mission project for 2015-16 and will collect diapers in their respective congregations; more details will be announced at their Fall Gathering on September 19.
