



REFLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY

Dear Siblings in Our Lord,

"Hear this, you that trample on the needy, and bring to ruin the poor of the land...
The Lord has sworn by the pride of Jacob: Surely I will not forget any of their deeds." (Amos 8: 4, 7)

Our Christian leaders are wrestling with how to make Christian Associates a more diverse and inclusive association. Make no mistake, we already are one of the most denominationally diverse ecumenical entities in the country with Catholic, Protestant and Orthodox judicatories at the table.

But are judicatories enough? Can we make a place at the table for independent and ethnic congregations not affiliated with an established denomination? Greater still is our conversation about the relationship of ecumenism to racial and social justice. How can we speak with a united voice about injustice so that the world hears in our words the voice of Jesus Christ and of God's providential love for all people? Our leaders don't want to be just another advocacy group. But how do we with one voice say, "Hear this, you..." and "Thus says the Lord..."? It is an issue that I am glad that the Council is addressing.

How can we speak with a united voice about injustice so that the world hears in our words the voice of Jesus Christ and of God's providential love for all people?

While they deliberate, I'll venture to raise some possibilities for their prophetic voice.

"Hear this," UPMC, Jeffrey Romoff and Directors (http://www.upmc.com/about/why-upmc/mission/pages/leadership.aspx),

"Hear this," HIGHMARK, William Winkenwerder, Jr., and Directors, (https://www.highmark.com/hmk2/about/corpprofile/board.shtml)

"Hear this, you" who create fear among the users of your medical care networks and insurance plans; who spread lies about each other; who are driven by egos, greed and quests for power and domination in the marketplace. Remember your mission to serve the medical needs of all the people. You are public charities and must earn again the public's trust that you are seeking the common good for everyone. Repent!

"Hear this, you" who demonize the poor, the hungry and the alien in our midst; who give large subsidies to corporate farmers but refuse to fund SNAP (food stamps) and would further cut feeding programs for women, infants, children and seniors; who impose means tests that degrade and stigmatize the needy; who are xenophobic about the stranger in our communities; who would deny expanded medical assistance to the poor and a path to citizenship for the immigrant. Repent!

Some will call these partisan, political issues. I do not. I understand them as Gospel issues and moral imperatives in response to that good news of God's grace and mercy upon us all through Jesus Christ. I anxiously await the day when a diverse group of Christian leaders speaks for justice with the voice of Christ. While I wait, I also need to listen; "Hear this, you" and then for my complicity in trampling on the needy and bringing to ruin the poor in our land, Repent!

Council Begins Search for New Executive



The Council of Bishops and Judicatory Executives has appointed Bishop Kurt Kusserow, SW PA Synod, ELCA to chair the Search Committee to select a successor for Pastor Don Green who will retire on March 31, 2014. At their recent meeting the Council finalized a position description and compensation parameters. The Executive Minister will be a full-time, two-year term call, renewable as resources permit and will begin April 2014.

Executive Minister Position Summary

The Executive Minister is the chief executive and administrative officer of Christian Associates, responsible to the Council of Bishops and Judicatory Executives. The Executive Minister is elected by the Council, acting as a committee of the whole. The Executive Minister acts as the executive for the corporation and as staff to the Council. The Executive manages the ministries of Christian Associates, its Council and Committees, and is the public face of the organization, representing Christian Associates and the Council in interfaith, government and community groups, events and programs.

The compensation package will include salary with housing allowance; pension and medical benefits, worker's compensation and disability insurance.
