It shall be a jubilee for you ..." - Leviticus 15:10


Please join Christian Associates in 2020 as we hallow our fiftieth year!

State Funds Available for Security Improvements in Houses of Worship

Mass shootings and acts of terror in houses of worship across our country have inspired an uncomfortable question: could that happen in my own church?

To help prevent another tragedy, Pennsylvania's 2020 budget has allocated \$5 million for security improvements to houses of worship and community centers across the Commonwealth. The funds will be distributed to organizations that serve populations that may be targets of hate crimes: including Protestant, Catholic, and Orthodox Christians. *Grant applications are due on February 14*, and may be found at https://www.pccd.pa.gov/schoolsafety/Pages/Non-Profit-Security-Grant-Fund.aspx.

The funds may be used for security enhancements to protect the safety of the users of a facility located in Pennsylvania that is owned or operated by a nonprofit organization. This might include safety trainings for the congregation or staff members; installation of metal detectors, security cameras, or lighting; security

assessments and planning; and upgrades to existing buildings.

Grant amounts will be between \$5,000 and \$150,000 per organization. Organizations requesting more than \$25,000 must provide matching funds from other funding sources.

REFLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY

Dear friends,

No matter what their role, spiritual leaders in Southwest Pennsylvania work in contexts affected by trauma.

Some serve in neighborhoods afflicted by violence, intergenerational poverty, and other manifestations of systemic racism.

Others came face to face with hate-fueled terror during the 10.27.18 synagogue shooting.

Some work with vulnerable populations every day, serving as chaplains to people who are incarcerated, or facing addiction, or living with mental illness. Others work in congregations, shepherding their people through grief, crisis, and pain.

Communities of faith are not the only ones to take note of the prevalence of trauma in our neighborhoods. In recent months, it seems as if every sector is moving toward "trauma-informed" practices. To help prepare Southwest Pennsylvania to address this challenge, the Center for Victims opened the *Healing Rivers Project* in April 2019. *Healing Rivers* offers a museum-quality learning experience about the impact of trauma on physical and mental health, and ways to move toward healing and resilience.

After visiting the Center for Victims last summer, Rabbi Ron Symons called me with excitement in his voice. Maybe, he suggested, there might be good that could come from the wrenching experience of trauma. Maybe learning together about trauma and resilience could help us better understand one another, and equip us to serve our communities more effectively.

And so, this winter, Christian Associates and the Center for Loving Kindness at the Jewish Community Center of Greater Pittsburgh have invited small, intentionally diverse groups of spiritual leaders to visit the Healing Rivers Project. Christians, Jews, Muslims, Buddhists, Hindus, and Baha'i believers have discovered common ground in our ministries and our humanity. We've shared deeply about our experiences and our struggles. In our speaking, our silence, and our learning, the conference table at the Center for Victims has become sacred space.

We begin each session with text study, diving into stories from our traditions that elucidate themes of trauma survival and pastoral response.

Reading these stories in a diverse group, where some know these texts by heart and others are meeting them for the first time, yields startling new insights. The richness of the scriptures comes alive as we explore these inexhaustibly meaningful stories.

Then, we enter the exhibit, learning about the connections between our brains and our bodies. We discover the effect that trauma has on our nervous system, on our physical and mental health, and even on our DNA. Then, we consider the protective factors that reduce trauma's devastating impact. We can never eliminate trauma from our lives, just as we can never stop the rain. But just as we can learn to carry an umbrella, we can build habits and relationships that nurture our wholeness and wellbeing.

Across all our diverse contexts, trauma shapes our lives and our ministries. But trauma does not get the final word. As disciples of the Great Physician, we believe Christ transforms trauma into healed and resurrected life. In the new relationships and deeper learning I've experienced so far in our shared work at the Healing Rivers Project, I've seen that new life right before my eyes.

Essays Invited from the Next Generation of Ecumenists

Students in middle and high school, college, graduate school, and seminary will share their ideas about Christian unity in Christian Associates' Jubilee Essay Contest.

"As part of our fiftieth anniversary celebrations, we want to look forward and encourage a new generation of ecumenical thinkers," said Rev. Liddy Barlow, CASP's Executive Minister. "We're excited to read what young leaders are thinking about the unity of the church."

First and second place winners will be named in each of three categories: middle/high school, undergraduate, and graduate school/seminary. First-place winners will receive \$250, and runners-up will receive \$100.


Authors of the winning essays will be recognized at Christian Associates' Jubilee Celebration on May 28, and their pieces will also be published in the anniversary edition of *The Word in Our Voices*, coming in September.

Each age group has a different question to address in their essays:

Students in grades 6-12 should prepare up to 500 words in response to the prompt, "In John 17:21, Jesus prayed 'that [Christians] may all be one.' When his prayer is fulfilled, what do you imagine that our unity will look like?"

Undergraduate college and university students will write up to 1,000 words on the topic: "Why does Christian unity matter in the 21st century?"

Seminarians and graduate students are invited to respond in up to 2,000 words to the question, "What opportunities and



obstacles do you anticipate in the next fifty years of the ecumenical movement?"

Each contest is open to students enrolled in schools located in Southwest Pennsylvania, as well as to students attending school elsewhere who have home addresses in our region.

Entries must be postmarked or emailed by April 15, 2020.
