

Light / The Holocaust & Humanity Project

Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre presents Light / The Holocaust & Humanity *Project*, a work that demonstrates how ballet can transcend the art form to become an agent of change, not only in the individual but also in the world. Set for five performances during the week of Kristallnacht, November 12-15 at the Byham Theater, this project extends beyond the stage, partnering with a broad spectrum of Pittsburgh organizations including Christian Associates and the United Jewish Federation's Holocaust Center to create educational programming and inspire a community-wide dialogue about the Holocaust. Of Faith and **Kristallnacht** on November 4 at

7:00 p.m. at The Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Monroeville is one such partnership.

Originally choreographed for Ballet Austin in 2005 by Artistic Director Stephen Mills, *Light* was created in response to the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, when Mills began contemplating the individual's responsibility to promote social justice. The resulting work features choreography that is often stark, athletic and raw, using symbolic movement in place of overt Holocaust references and Nazi imagery. Divided into five sections, the ballet explores the universal themes of family, segregation, isolation, survival and the hope of the unconquerable human



spirit. Holocaust survivor Elie Wiesel wrote, "Some things are too large to write about, but nothing is too small.' With that passage in mind, the ballet follows one person's journey from suffering to salvation.

REFLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY



Dear Siblings in Our Lord,

As I write, the G-20 Pittsburgh Summit is about to begin. For southwestern Pennsylvania the world has come to the fork of our sacred three rivers. The Sherpas have done their advanced planning; the finance ministers and heads of state are enroute. Advocates of many diverse causes have issued their press releases and protestors have taken to the streets. With the eyes of the world upon us we are overwhelmed by the diversity of peoples and tongues, and differences of opinion and perspective of those who come to our hometown. There is a cacophony of varied sounds and competing messages pounding into our consciousness.

As people of faith how are we to deal with such diversity of humanity and competing claims for what is fair and just for the good of all? What does our Christian faith and our respective confessional traditions have to assist us in responding with hospitality, openness to listen, and dialogue without compromising the particularity of our deep-seated beliefs?

In Genesis we find our common roots in Adam; we are all one flesh in God's creation. But we also learn of human sin which would divide siblings one from another, clans and tribes, nations and languages in terms of protecting my own perceived superiority over my neighbor. It is the latter that we see enacted in the Pittsburgh Summit and accompanying statements, street theater and rallies, as nations and groups compete for recognition, resources, and power.

On September 21 the interfaith community of Pittsburgh offered one response. Without sacrificing the particularity of our Christian faith or Jewish or Muslim beliefs, we came together to give public witness to peace and unity as common siblings of Adam. We prayed for peace, both during the summit, but also for global reconciliation, an end to warfare, and genuine peace with justice for all the world's inhabitants. From each of our sacred texts reflections were offered that were powerfully prophetic in their common call for a just distribution of creation's resources, particular attention to the needs of the poor and marginalized, and for the care of the earth and it's environment. Praying together amid our diversity and great differences, we demonstrated to those who gather for the G-20 summit what faith has to say to economic power and justice.

By the time you read this letter the summit will be over. We'll get back to our routines and find something else to grumble about besides congested traffic and disrupted commerce. I pray that our continued response to diversity of opinion and disparity of resources and opportunity will reflect our interfaith witness at St. Paul Cathedral. However, as we look to the commemoration of Kristallnacht, we know all too well that even people of faith can be caught up in the sin that divides and exploits. May we continue to be faithful for the sake of our neighbor, to everyone who is also our sibling in the flesh.

Ericksen's books, Theologians Under Hitler (1985) and Betrayal: German Churches and the Holocaust (1999) were widely acclaimed, and were the subject of a PBS documentary in 2004. In addition to chronicling the roots of "resurrection" ideology associated with German nationalism, the film examined efforts to deny the Jewish roots of Christianity. It also introduces viewers to three theologians: Paul Althaus, Emanuel Hirsch, and Gerhard Kittel, who in varying degrees supported Adolf Hitler and the ideology of the Nazi party. Although the subject matter is difficult, "it doesn't mean that we shouldn't challenge ourselves to understand how Christians respond to important political questions or to look into the circumstances where Christians have responded badly," Ericksen says. "Just because it's difficult doesn't mean we shouldn't strive to be as honest and courageous as we can be to look at Christian practice and faith where times were hard and mistakes were made." He maintains affiliations with the Humboldt Foundation of the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum, and sits on the editorial board of Kirchliche Zeitgeschichte, an important German journal.

Following Dr. Ericksen's presentation a panel will engage him in making connections to faith and the Church today. Panelists include: Sister Gemma del Duca, National Catholic Center for Holocaust Education at Seton Hill University, Greensburg; Rabbi James Gibson, head rabbi at Temple Sinai, Pittsburgh; and Pastor Don Green, Executive Director, Christian Associates of Southwest Pennsylvania. "My ideal audience will be 90% Christian and 10% Jewish," says Pastor Green. The Jews understand the church's role in the Holocaust. Christians do not. It's not something we talk about. We need to understand the church's failure to speak against evil, and where does that come into play in our day? We need to think about the issue of how we deal with anybody who is different from us, especially when economic times are tough." There is no charge for this event, which is open to clergy and laity.
