## New Pastor to the Pittsburgh Presbytery

The Pittsburgh Presbytery has called the Rev. Dr. Sheldon Sorge to serve as their new Pastor to the Presbytery. Prior to his call to Pittsburgh, Dr. Sorge served as the Associate Director of The Louisville Institute, Louisville Seminary where he also served as Adjunct Professor of Worship. He served on the initial design team and continues to serve in the leadership of the Presbyterian CREDO program, which provides opportunities for clergy to examine significant areas of their lives and to prayerfully discern the future direction of their vocation as they respond to God's call in a lifelong process of practice and transformation. From 2000-2006, Pastor Sorge was Associate for Theology, General Assembly Council, Presbyterian Church (USA).

Dr. Sorge earned a diploma in Pastoral Ministry from Elim Bible Institute in 1975 and a B.A. in Religion and Philosophy from Roberts Wesleyan College in 1981. Duke University awarded him both a M.A. (1983) and a Ph.D. (1987) in Theology and Ethics. In 1993 he was ordained a Minister of the Word and Sacrament by the Abingdon Presbytery. He has served as pastor to congregations in Marion, VA and Elkins, WV.

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## Number of Pittsburgh Youth Affected by Violence Higher Than National Average

The Metro-Urban Institute (MUI) of Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, through an informal survey of youth ages 9-18 conducted in October 2009, found that 78.9% of those surveyed had experienced hand-gun violence; either a family member or close friend had been shot. Nationally, an average of 60% of youth report some form of experience with violence and this figure includes all types of violence, including domestic abuse and bullying, not just gun-related violence.

The survey was prompted by the work of MUI and its collaboration with the Pittsburgh Coalition Against Violence. Christian Associates Council of Bishops and Executives has been collaborating with the Coalition and the Pittsburgh Youth Futures Commission to engage congregations and individuals in addressing youth violence not only in Pittsburgh but in the entire region.

# REFLECTIONS ALONG THE WAY

#### Dear Siblings in Our Lord,

Recently I was selecting hymns for an ecumenical service. I grabbed my denomination's new hymnal to type the text, only to find an alternate translation of the lyrics. Our prior hymnal read, *Spread, oh spread, almighty Word, Spread the reign of God the Lord. Tell how his own Son he gave, All from sin and death to save.* To my surprise the new hymnal had changed the second line of the stanza to *Send forth our Creator's call, heaven's gifts extend to all.* What a difference!

I do not dispute that indeed it is the Father's (*our Creator's*) intent to love the whole creation and all humanity. One cannot deny the clarity of John 3:16-18. We need only look to the history of God's covenantal love to Israel, his steadfast faithfulness, even in the face of the nation's and peoples' frequent rebellion to see God's intention. Yes, God loves all humankind and individually every one of us.

But does this new lyric proclaim grace without a cost; abundant life without suffering; eternal life without transformation? Is the author of the new text proposing a new universalism with a sugar daddy god who accepts us as we are without any need for repentance and personal change of heart and behavior? Fortunately, later stanzas remain faithful to Trinitarian confession and the importance of God's Son – his incarnation, death and resurrection so that *heaven's gifts extend to all*.

With the Great Fast (Feb. 15) and Lent (Feb. 17) upon us, I much prefer the older text, *Tell how his own Son he gave, All from sin and death to save*. With violence all around us; with disease, disaster and death claiming lives; with our prisons overflowing and neighbors still bound by guilt and shame one must acknowledge the reality of sin and human sinning. We remain a broken race, alienated from our Prodigal Parent and from one another. Without God's gracious intervention into our dark dilemma, death is our just end and there is no hope for the future of humanity. Yes, *Tell how his own Son he gave, All from sin and death to save*.

This penitential season is indeed a time for both personal and corporate reflection and repentance; a time of genuine turning from sinning and to new obedience to our Father's will. This is not about earning God's favor but about being transformed into the likeness of the Son – obedient, sacrificial love for the other, because he has already given his life for us. For such turning from sin and amendment of life we need God's help. *Tell of God the Spirit giv'n, Now to guide us on to heav'n, Strong and holy, just and true, Working both to will and do.* 

May the Spirit lead you to reflect upon the costly suffering of Jesus, the price of obedience to the Father's will for him, rejoice in God the Father's mercy and grace to us his errant children, and then to Christ-like love and sacrificial service to our neighbor.

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# The Way Forward in Darfur and South Sudan

Featured Speaker: Special Envoy to Sudan, Maj. Gen. (Ret) Scott Gration

The Way Forward in Darfur and South Sudan, a very important national conference from the standpoint of both inter-Sudanese dialogue and policy and advocacy, will take place on March 19-21, 2010, at Carnegie Mellon University -- one month before critical Sudan-wide Elections. The Pittsburgh Darfur Emergency Committee is especially pleased to note that the President's Special Envoy to Sudan, Major General (Ret) Scott Gration will be participating in a public event in connection with the conference on Saturday, March 20.

Over the course of the past year, nearly 100 southern Sudanese and Darfuri leaders living in the U.S. have expressed interest in coming together to discuss the future of their country and how they can lead for peace from the U.S. While Pittsburgh-based southern Sudanese had attended local rallies before last year, their strong turnout at the Save Darfur Coalition's April 2009 event in Washington D.C. indicated a serious convergence of interests and aims between their community and the Darfuri Diaspora. The collaboration between Darfuris, southern Sudanese, and other U.S. activists was strengthened in common G-20 advocacy efforts and a pre-conference planning meeting on Oct. 17–18, 2009. ## Earned Income Tax Credit Puts Money in Pockets, Boosts Economy

The federal government estimates that approximately \$38 million in Earned Income Credits is left unclaimed by eligible taxpayers in Allegheny County each year.

The United Way of Allegheny County and the Money In Your Pocket Coalition are partnering to provide free tax preparation services to low-income individuals and families to put more of this money in local pockets.

The Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) is the nation's largest anti-poverty program. For a full-time minimum wage worker, the EITC could represent as much as three months of take home pay.

#### EITC Eligibility:

- Families with one child who earned less than \$35,463 in 2009 (or less than \$40,463 for married workers) are eligible for a refundable credit of up to \$3,043.
- Families with two children who earned less than \$40,295 in 2009 (or less than \$45,295 for married workers) are eligible for a refundable credit of up to \$5,028.
- Families with three or more children who earned less than \$43,279 in 2009 (or less than \$48,279 for married workers) are eligible for a refundable credit of up to \$5,657.

• Workers without a qualifying child, who earned less than \$13,440 in 2009 (or less than \$18,440 for married workers) are eligible for a credit of up to \$457.

There are several ways that local taxpayers can access free tax services. For families with incomes up to \$40,000 and individuals with incomes up to \$20,000, The Money In Your Pocket – Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) sites provide tax preparation services at four locations: Just Harvest, South Side; Just Harvest at CCAC, Boyce Campus, Monroeville; Parental Stress Center, East Liberty; and Goodwill of Southwestern PA at McKeesport. At these sites, IRS-certified volunteers will assist taxpayers with federal, state, and local taxes and offer referrals to other community services which may assist people in achieving or maintaining financial stability.

### **Oikocredit**

Oikocredit, a worldwide cooperative society founded by the World Council of Churches in 1975, promotes global justice by challenging people, churches, and others to share their resources through socially responsible investments and by empowering disadvantaged people with credit.

**Oiko** refers to the classical Greek word, *Oikos*, meaning house, the place where people live together. **Credit** not only refers to the financial credit; it also refers to the "credo" of Oikocredit; the belief that economically poor people are reliable business partners who can create jobs and income for themselves, if only given credit.

Oikocredit is the largest international private provider of Microcredit in the world. Small loans for incomegenerating projects to poor people in Asia, Africa, and Latin America go a long way to improving health, nutrition, education, housing, and self-esteem. Oikocredit provides loans to over 400 microfinance institutions, which then loan to millions of people in 65 countries.

Oikocredit also provides loans to over 65 Fair Trade cooperatives around the world. Perhaps your church serves and sells Fair Trade coffee or chocolate, much of which is coming from Fair Trade cooperatives funded by Oikocredit. Oikocredit receives its capital for making loans to the world's poor from socially responsible investments primarily from Christian communities and individuals. Since Oikocredit's start, all investors have received annual interest plus their full investment returned to them upon redemption. The lives of the poor are changed through economic participation and they maintain their local economies by paying back their loans.

## Disaster Response

Member judicatories of Christian Associates and their denominations have been responding to the devastating earthquakes in Haiti. A marvelous collaboration of faith-based agencies, political leaders and government, corporations, hospitals and medical personnel enabled the evacuation of 54 orphans to Pittsburgh.

But disasters also continue locally. Flooding last June in the Turtle Creek Valley has left many unmet needs in the nearby communities. Since this was not a declared disaster by FEMA, victims were not eligible for any government assistance. A long-term recovery team has been established to address the needs of those communities. Christian Associates is administering raised funds, and also serves as the fiscal and administrative agent for the Western PA VOAD (Volunteers Active in Disaster).

Recently Pastor Don Green convened a meeting of VOAD members, major first responders including the Red Cross, The Salvation Army, Catholic Charities, United Way, and Region 13 Emergency Management representatives to review the Turtle Creek flooding response. The participating VOAD members and responders agreed to a more efficient and expeditious sharing of information to avoid duplication of services to disaster victims.

Christian Associates is committed to establishing a Disaster Preparedness and Response Committee with representatives of each of our member judicatories. A chair person is needed for the Committee. Respondents to the survey were drawn from several Pittsburgh after-school programs dealing with school-age youth and East End area congregations. The purpose of the survey was to get some idea of what young people think concerning violence and what is important to them. The survey also asked other questions about favorite subjects in school, ways to stop street violence, people youth admired, favorite entertainers, and what they pray for the most. Asked for suggestions for stopping street violence, 18.9% thought that banning or reducing access to guns or tightening gun control laws would be helpful.

When asked about their prayer habits, youth who either indicated that they did not pray or were unable to provide examples of prayer in their everyday lives were most likely to provide no solutions as to how to reduce violence or to indicate that they did not believe it was possible to stop or reduce the violence. All youth who indentified a practice of spiritually-rooted prayer provided suggestions regarding how to reduce violence and expressed belief that healing was possible.

Pastor Don Green joined Dr. Ron Peters, Director of MUI; Rev. Saleem Ghubrill, Pittsburgh Promise; and M. Gayle Moss, Pittsburgh NAACP at a press conference to announce the results of the survey. All agreed that continued collaboration by churches and schools, parents and community organizations, law enforcement, and government is needed to create positive futures for our youth marked by success in education, ability to find employment, and stable homes.


