Methodists, Lutherans To Celebrate Ten Years of Full Communion

On May 24, 1738, Methodist founder John Wesley heard a reading from Martin Luther's Preface to the Epistle to the Romans. Wesley felt that his heart was "strangely warmed." But this pivotal moment was not the last time that followers of Wesley and Luther would have their hearts strangely warmed together.

In 2009, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) entered into a full communion agreement with the United Methodist Church (UMC). This agreement affirmed a shared understanding of baptism, Eucharist, and ministry, and allowed for the shared celebration of Holy Communion and the exchange of ordained ministers.

But ten years after this significant agreement was adopted, many local churches have not lived into the ministry opportunities this agreement affords.

This fall, the Southwestern PA Synod of the ELCA and the Western PA

UMC Conference are celebrating the tenth anniversary of full communion with "A Season of Celebrating."

The season will commence with a Celebratory Worship Service on Sunday, October 20 at 4 p.m. at St. John's Lutheran Church of Highland (311 Cumberland Rd, Pittsburgh

15237) with ELCA Bishop Kurt Kusserow preaching and UMC Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi presiding. Participants are invited to RSVP by emailing ELCAUMC@gmail.com.

A Season of Celebrating will then continue with Local Communion Celebrations, as individual congregations partner with nearby UMC or ELCA churches for a joint Communion worship service, bible study, fellowship meal, or mission project. The long-term goal is that grassroots partnerships will eventually lead to opportunities for the sharing and exchange of ordained ministers. Participating churches are invited to complete a survey at www.bit. ly/ELCAUMC.

Organizers hope not only that hearts will be warmed, but that Methodist and Lutheran churches will be equipped and sent for a new season of fruitful ministry – together.



Christians Invited to Share in Commemorating October 27 Synagogue Shootings



Our region will mark a somber anniversary on **Sunday, October 27**: the one-year mark of the massacre at Tree of Life Synagogue in Squirrel Hill. There are many ways that Christians can demonstrate our support for the victims' families and the Jewish community.

The families of the victims have asked that churches show their support by ringing church bells at 9:50 a.m., the time of the attack. Churches might also choose to mark the anniversary that morning in worship by remembering the event in spoken prayers, by lighting candles in memory of the eleven victims, or by keeping a time of silence.

The day will also include a series of official commemorative events, known as "Remember.

Repair. Together," in which Christians are welcome to participate.

They include a time of community service from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in various locations throughout the city, and group Torah studies from 2-4 p.m. at Congregation Rodef Shalom (4905 Fifth Avenue, Pittsburgh 15213). To review the options and sign up, visit www.pittsburghoct27.org.

The day concludes with a public memorial service at 5 p.m. at Soldiers & Sailors Memorial Hall. Participants will include Rev. Liddy Barlow of Christian Associates, who will help to represent the support of the interfaith community.

REFLECTIONS ALONG THE MAY

Dear friends,

I know this is a weird thing for a Congregationalist to say, but I love the saints.

I love the stories of Christian women and men who have sought to follow Jesus. I love their diversity, the thousands of different personalities, styles, gifts, nationalities, and backgrounds that demonstrate there's no single way to be holy. I love their presence: the way they hover close when we come around the Lord's table.

And I'm not alone. When the Council of Bishops and Judicatory Executives met last month, I asked them to name their favorite saints. Here's a glimpse of our conversation, which sheds light on the saints – but also on the men and women who seek to follow in their footsteps:

"We [Presbyterians] are not a tradition that canonizes people," said Dr. Sheldon Sorge, General Minister of Pittsburgh Presbytery, "but one who is important to me is St. Augustine. As I studied John Calvin and Martin Luther, they led me straight to Augustine, regarding who God is and what God requires of us. I was formed in a different way of answering those questions, and I am grateful for Augustine, who taught me about grace."

"One of my favorites is St. Josephine Bakhita," replied Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi of the Western Pennsylvania Conference of the United Methodist Church, who learned about the saints during her studies at Loyola. "She was a Sudanese woman who was kidnapped and sold into slavery. She had very harsh owners, and eventually was sold to a family who brought her to Italy and left her with an order of nuns. It was there that she met Jesus and went through a miraculous process of forgiveness and healing. She was able to endure the evil that was done to her and pass it up to God, so God could do something beautiful with it. That's akin to the

story of African Americans in this country who were abused by slavemasters but persevered in faith."

Rev. Carl Johnson of the Mid-Northeast Mission District of the North American Lutheran Church commented, "I have a hate-love relationship with St. Peter. I hate him with all my heart because he does nothing but screw up, over and over and over again. And yet, I see myself in him. Every time I think the lightning bolt should come down or he should sink to the bottom of the sea, there is instead grace, forgiveness, and restoration, and therefore hope."

Fr. Ron Larko, who serves as a proxy representative to the Council for the Byzantine Catholic Archeparchy of Pittsburgh, said, "St. John Vianney was a priest who was sent into a town that was against him. He struggled to bring conversion to the parish and the town; he wasn't top-notch in intellectual prowess. But still, he was able to call on the Spirit. The Spirit moved in him, and he continually gave his life to God to do ministry. He is the patron of priests."

Peter Clement, who represents the Bruderhof Communities, chose St. Francis of Assisi. "My wife, Francisca, is named after him. While her mother was

expecting her, she was reading the *Little Flowers of St. Francis*. Francis turned away from wealth and position to become a simple follower of Jesus; his love for the poor and for creation is inspiring."

As for me, I love St. Hilda, a seventh-century English abbess of a monastery for both men and women, host of the important ecumenical Synod of Whitby: a woman of administrative giftedness and pastoral sensitivity. She's my role model. Across the centuries, she's also my friend.

As Western churches commemorate All Saints Day this November, may you feel inspired and accompanied by the saints of the church in their glorious diversity. "O blest communion, fellowship divine! We feebly struggle, they in glory shine; yet all are one in Thee, for all are Thine. Alleluia! Alleluia!"







Join us for Course 1: *History and Theology of Catechesis,* during Week One of Trinity's Winter InterTerm, January 6-10, 2020.

This six-course program may be taken at the non-credit level toward a Certificate of Christian Catechesis or for credit as the core curriculum of an MAR in Catechesis and Christian Formation. Students will be instructed in the history, theology, pedagogical principles, and core content (creedal, moral, spiritual) of classic Christian formation—while being trained to effectively catechize children, youth, or adults. Courses 1 and 2 will be offered annually (online and residential) as prerequisites to the subsequent courses offered during future Trinity InterTerms:

- Course 2: Principles and Practices of Catechesis (June 2020)
- Course 3: Teaching the Rule of Faith Scripture and Creed (January 2021)
- Course 4: Teaching the Rule of Hope Prayer and Spiritual Practice (June 2021)
- Course 5: Teaching the Rule of Love Holiness and Service (January 2022)
- Course 6: Catechesis in Context Local Ministry Practicum (Spring 2022)
