Dear friends.

"So what is an Executive Minister?" they ask me, and six months after taking on this work I think I finally know how to respond.

T'm an administrator, yes. A writer of emails. A herder of bishops. A scheduler of meetings. A maker of plans. But most of all, I am a witness.

So much of my work on your behalf for Christian Associates involves bearing witness. Take Labor Day weekend, for example. On Saturday, I joined pilgrims from all over the nation for the annual pilgrimage to the Our Lady of Perpetual Help Shrine at Mount St. Macrina Monastery of the Sisters of St. Basil in Uniontown. I joined in the procession, the a capella Byzantine Mass, and the ritual blessing of the waters. I shared lunch with the sisters, and drove home nibbling delicious *medovniki*, the traditional pilgrimage honey cakes.

On Sunday, I worshiped at my home congregation, Smithfield United Church of Christ in downtown Pittsburgh. No incense or glittering crowns in evidence there: instead, blue jeans and t-shirts and wild hugging during the passing of the peace. We heard a sermon on justice and affirmed a wide welcome for people of every description.

Monday morning found me downtown again, in a very different milieu: sitting in the pew behind Mayor Peduto, County Executive Fitzgerald, and gubernatorial candidate Tom Wolf, singing "We've

Come This Far By Faith" with the great choir of St. Benedict the Moor, and hearing a rousing Labor Day sermon. Together we marched down Grant Street with thousands of working people in the annual parade.

And then, on Tuesday, with our staff away at a continuing education event, I filled in as substitute chaplain at Allegheny County Jail. In that sterile, brutal environment, I met men with broken hearts, and wept as I prayed with them. I saw our volunteers working tirelessly to bring them hygiene products, word puzzles, Bibles, and hope.

Bearing witness has been the task of Christians since Jesus sent his disciples to "go and tell John what you hear and see." Commissioning his disciples just before the ascension, Jesus told them, "you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in

Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." As witnesses, we take careful notice of how God is working in the world around us. Then, we share what we have seen, helping others to hear and understand the good news.

As I work as a witness for Christian Associates, it's my privilege and responsibility to notice and share how the Spirit is present in so many diverse settings. I observe how our common commitment to Jesus and our love for his church is made manifest. I find surprising common ground and potentials for collaboration. And then, I get to tell stories. I go and tell what I have heard and

Dr. Lucinda Mosher, an Episcopal theologian and the director of interfaith chaplaincy programs at Hartford Seminary, recently offered a lecture sponsored by the Greater Pittsburgh Interfaith Coalition. The corollary to the commandment "Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor," she said, is "Thou shall bear true witness to thy neighbors." The work of witnessing is, of course, not mine alone. All of us have the joy and responsibility to be witnesses. All of us can seek out an unfamiliar worship experience, an unvisited neighborhood, a new event. Go forth and be witnesses to what God is doing – and then, go and tell what you hear and see.
